1	Samsung files a new Rule 7-11 administrative request, seeking leave to file a reply or	
2	seeking a hearing on its July 1, 2013, Rule 7-11 request, which itself sought to vacate all dates in	
3	the Court's April 29, 2013, Case Management Order (Dkt. No. 2316). Samsung intentionally, but	
4	improperly, chose Rule 7-11 as the basis for its initial request. Rule 7-11 clearly excludes both	
5	replies and hearings. Samsung's original request was not a proper Rule 7-11 motion, but that is	
6	no reason to allow Samsung to abuse the process twice over by filing a new motion and a reply.	
7	This alone is sufficient reason to deny the request.	
8	Samsung's arguments for filing a reply provide no reason to deviate from the clear	
9	mandate of the local rules. Samsung claims that the present Rule 7-11 record is too truncated to	
10	resolve these "complex" issues (Dkt. No. 2333-2 at 1), but that is a compelling reason to adhere	
11	to the motion to strike procedure that the Court established in the Case Management Order not a	
12	reason to add a reply.	
13	Samsung argues that a reply is needed because Samsung provided "no substantive	
14	declarations in support" of its initial request, while Apple's opposition supported its statements	
15	with declarations and evidence. (Dkt. No. 2333-2 at 1.) Samsung's failure to support its motion	
16	is not a basis to make new arguments in the guise of a reply brief.	
17	Further, Samsung's proposed reply merely reargues points from its original brief, with no	
18	new cases and no new evidence. A reply that simply repeats attorney arguments is not a	
19	necessary or useful expansion of the record.	
20	The Court's motion to strike procedure and schedule provides a more than adequate	
21	means to resolve the issues that Samsung has raised. The Court should deny Samsung's present	
22	motion for leave to file a reply or set a hearing.
