1 Defendants Samsung Electronics Co., Ltd., Samsung Electronics America, Inc., and 2 Samsung Telecommunications America, LLC (collectively "Samsung") submit this Second 3 Amended Disclosure of Asserted Claims and Infringement Contentions pursuant to Patent Local Rules 3-1 and 3-2 for U.S. Patent Nos. 7,756,087, 7,551,596, 7,672,470, 7,577,757, 7,232,058, 4 5 6,292,179, 6,226,449, and 5,579,239 (the "Samsung patents").

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#### **IDENTIFICATION OF INFRINGED CLAIMS AND ACCUSED PRODUCTS** I. [PATENT L.R. 3-1(a)-(d)]

7 On June 15, 2012, Samsung timely served its Disclosure of Asserted Claims and 8 Infringement Contentions (the "Original Disclosure"). On September 28, 2012, Samsung served 9 its Amended Disclosure of Asserted Claims and Infringed Contentions (the "First Amended 10 Disclosure") to provide information required by Patent Local Rule 3-1(a)-(d) for the iPhone 5. On 11 November 15, 2012, the Court granted Samsung's motion for leave to amend its disclosures 12 through the First Amended Disclosure. See Dkt. No. 302. The Court recognized that Samsung 13 would serve additional amended disclosures to address newly released products such as the iPad 4, 14 and iPad Mini. Id. at 12. Through this amendment, Samsung hereby supplements its Original 15 Disclosure and First Amended Disclosure under Patent Local Rule 3-1 to address the iPod Touch 16 5th Generation, iPad 4, and iPad Mini as set forth in the following exhibits: 17

Samsung further 16 incorporates by reference it Original Disclosure and First Amended Disclosure under Patent L.R. 17 3-1(e). 18 III. **PRIORITY DATES** 19 [PATENT L.R. 3-1(f)] 20 Samsung has already provided the information required by Local Rule 3-1 in its Disclosure 21 of Asserted Claims and Infringement Contentions served on June 15, 2012. Since there are more than 20 million songs in the iTunes Store, chances are your music is already in iCloud. And for the few songs that aren't, iTunes uploads what it can't match (which is much faster than uploading your entire music library). Even better, all the music iTunes matches plays back from iCloud at 256-Kbps AAC DRM-free quality — even if your original copy was of lower quality.

Once your music is in iCloud, you can stream it to any of your devices. Just browse the complete list of all your music stored in the cloud. To listen to a song, tap the iCloud icon next to it and your song starts playing. You can store up to 25,000 songs in iCloud (more if songs are purchased from the iTunes Store), but only what you want to play is stored on your device. So you have immediate access to a huge music library without taking up storage space.
